

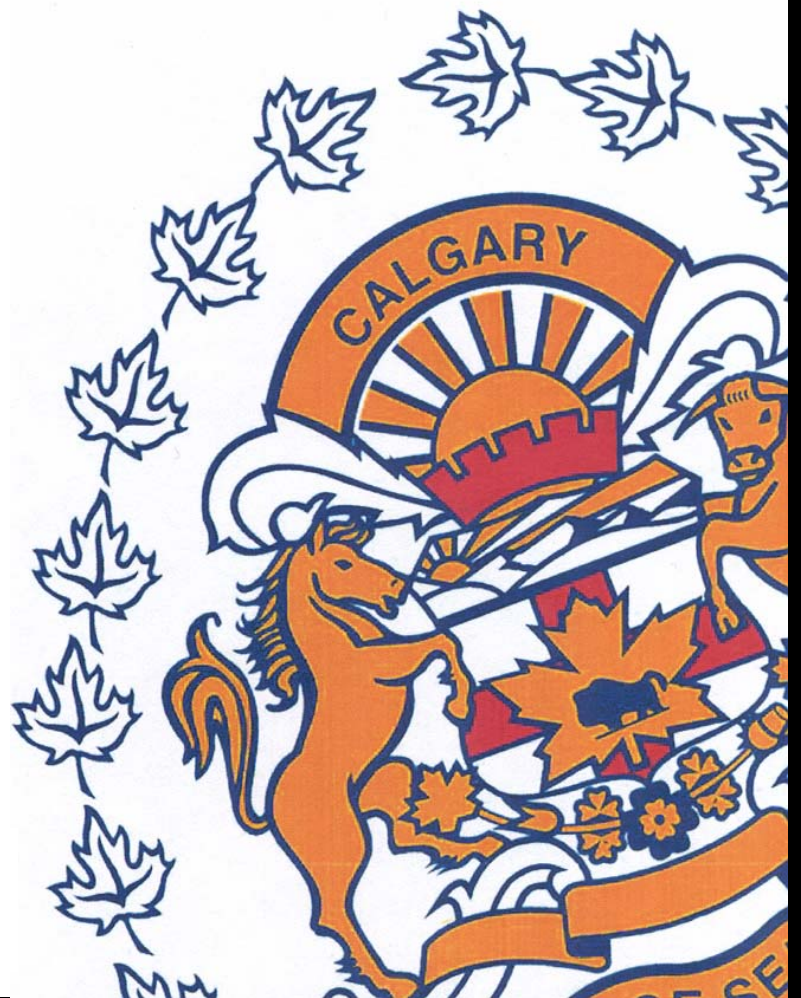

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## REPORT NOTES

Most of the statistical data in this report are derived from the Police Information Management System (PIMS) and compiled by the Centralized Analysis Unit. The numbers reported may change on a daily basis due to the dynamic nature of offences being reported and cleared. Disorder data is derived from the CAD system and is static.

To a large extent, the data in this report are based on accumulated to date information. **(Except for the Monthly Highlights which are based on static information (i.e.: a snap-shot in time).**

- For offences based on accumulated to date information, the number of offences recorded may be higher than previously reported (i.e. in previous statistical reports) due to late reporting. Although this does not greatly affect the number of occurrences for all offences, for some categories it may be as high as a 30-40% increase. The published data for the current period can therefore be expected to increase as time passes. As a result, readers should exercise caution when making comparisons between historical data and current data (i.e. previous year to this year) as data for the historic period will now include late reported offences, but data for the current period will not at this time. To achieve an effective comparison, current data should be evaluated against the originally published data for the historic period.
- Likewise, late reporting affects the number and percentage of offences cleared. Cases are often cleared months and sometimes years later. Consequently, clearances for previous years may appear to be much higher than those of the present year. Cases “cleared by charge” and those “cleared otherwise” are included in these totals.
- For offences based on “static” or “snap-shot” information, data totals will only reflect the number of offences reported in the original publication. They are not updated. Although late reporting may occur, and offences may continue to be cleared as time passes, these new events are not taken into account when preparing this statistical report.

A single incident may result in multiple offences, with each unique *Criminal Code* violation within the incident being counted as an offence. Furthermore, person crime offences are typically counted by the number of victims. Please note that offences are assigned to the month in which the offence “started”, not the month they were reported or cleared. Also note that “attempted” incidents are included in these totals. For a more detailed explanation of the Offence counting procedure, please contact the Centralized Analysis Unit.

In July 2006 the electronic reporting process with respect to 24-hour suspensions changed. This is reflected by a large decrease in Provincial Statute offences.

## Monthly Highlights – STATIC NUMBER COMPARISON

To reduce the impact of late reporting, comments on this page are a comparison between the CPS April 2009 Statistical Report and the CPS April 2008 Statistical Report (see next page "Calgary Crime Statistics – STATIC NUMBERS"). To achieve an effective comparison, current data should be evaluated against the originally published data for the historic period.

### APRIL 2009

#### PERSON CRIME

- ◆ Reported **person crimes** for the month of April 2009 increased 21.5% when compared to April 2008 (712 offences in April 2009 vs. 586 in April 2008); year-to-date numbers reflect an increase of 3.6% (2590 offences YTD 2009 vs. 2501 YTD 2008).
- ◆ Total **robbery** offences for the month of April 2009 increased 38.5% when compared to April 2008 (108 offences in April 2009 vs. 78 in April 2008); year-to-date offences increased 9.2% when compared to YTD 2008.
  - There were 4 **financial robberies** this month, compared to 2 in April 2008;
  - There were 30 **commercial robberies** this month, compared to 18 in April 2008;
  - There were 72 **street robberies** this month, compared to 53 in April 2008.
  - **Home invasions** decreased (2 offences this month, compared to 5 in April 2008).
- ◆ **Assaults** increased 16.9% this month (497 offences in April 2009 vs. 425 in April 2008); year-to-date figures remain stable (1794 offences YTD 2009 vs. 1798 YTD 2008).
- ◆ There were 49 **miscellaneous person crime** offences this month compared to 24 in April 2008.

#### PROPERTY CRIME

- ◆ Reported **property crimes** this month decreased 4.8% when compared to April 2008 (3222 offences in April 2009 compared to 3383 offences in April 2008); year-to-date figures decreased 8.2% (12947 offences YTD 2009 vs. 14106 offences YTD 2008).
- ◆ **Vehicle theft** (including attempts) decreased 41.3% this month when compared to April 2008 (420 offences in April 2009 vs. 716 in April 2008); year-to-date figures reflect a decrease of 35.1% (1588 offences YTD 2009 vs. 2448 offences YTD 2008).
- ◆ **Theft** offences increased 14.5% this month when compared to April 2008 (1590 offences in April 2009 vs. 1389 in April 2008); year-to-date offences remain stable.
- ◆ **Break and enter** offences this month decreased 21.5% when compared to April 2008 (347 offences this month compared to 442 in April 2008); year-to-date offences decreased 7.8% (1592 offences YTD 2009 vs. 1727 YTD 2008).
  - **Residential break and enter** offences decreased 6.9% this month (135 offences in April 2009 vs. 145 in April 2008);
  - **Commercial break and enter** offences decreased 31.6% this month when compared to April 2008 (173 offences in April 2009 vs. 253 in April 2008).
- ◆ **Fraud related** offences increased 35.9% this month (159 offences in April 2009 vs. 117 in April 2008); year-to-date offences increased 13.6% (769 offences YTD 2009 vs. 677 YTD 2008).

#### OTHER OFFENCES

- ◆ There were 130 **weapon-related** offences this month compared to 87 in April 2008; year-to-date figures reflect a 17% increase (476 offences YTD 2009 vs. 407 YTD 2008).
- ◆ Year-to-date **vice** offences decreased 67.6% (11 offences YTD 2009 vs. 34 offences YTD 2008).
- ◆ **Drug** offences increased 31.3% when compared to April 2008 (172 offences in April 2009 vs. 131 in April 2008); year-to-date figures reflect an increase of 3.5% (626 offences YTD 2009 vs. 605 YTD 2008).

## Calgary Crime Statistics – STATIC NUMBERS

The static crime numbers on this page are derived from historical Calgary Police Service Monthly Statistical Reports. These statistics are used when writing the Monthly Highlights page in order to make a fair comparison using data which has not been allowed to increase due to late reporting of crime. Using static numbers allows us to compare crime levels at a specific point in time and make an accurate determination of increases or decreases.

The cumulative crime numbers (pages 8 – 11) are statistics derived from the CPS Police Information Management System. P.I.M.S. cannot produce static numbers and therefore the cumulative numbers reflect any late reporting of crime. To achieve an effective comparison, current data should be evaluated against the originally published data for the historic period.

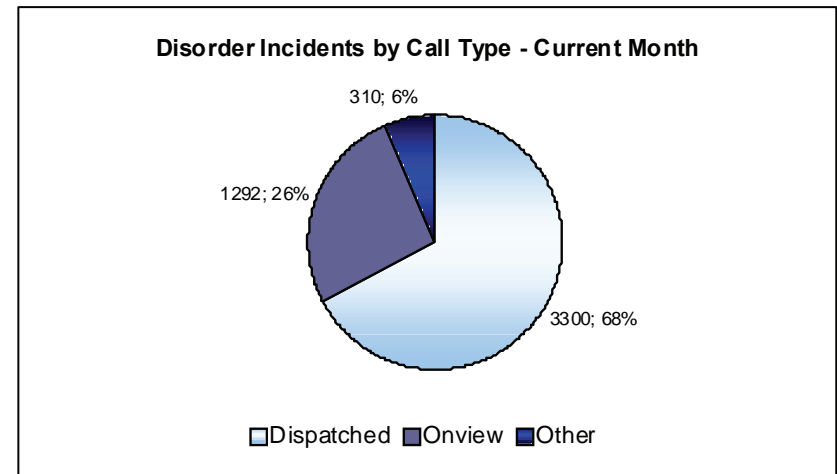
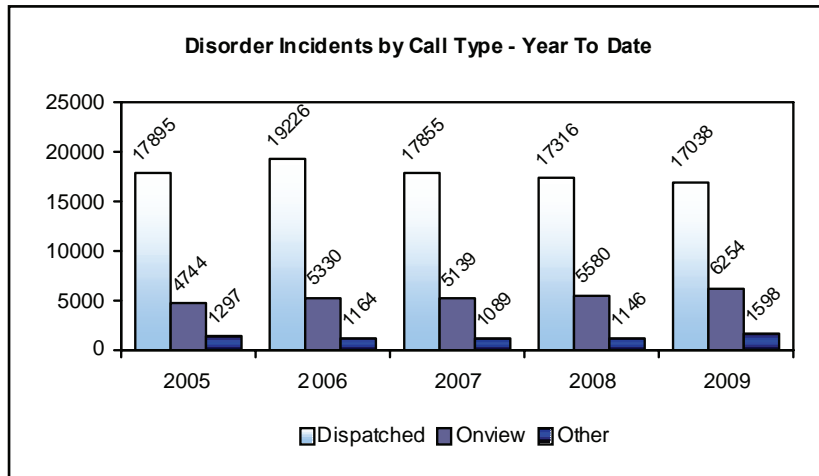

## Calgary Disorder Statistics – CALLS FOR SERVICE

In addition to monitoring crime levels, the Calgary Police Service uses a range of incident types to record levels of "Social Disorder". The incident types selected for this disorder index are those which can have a negative impact on citizens' quality of life and perception of safety, particularly in public places. These incidents do not tend to be represented well in "traditional" crime statistics which have a propensity to focus more on person and property crime.

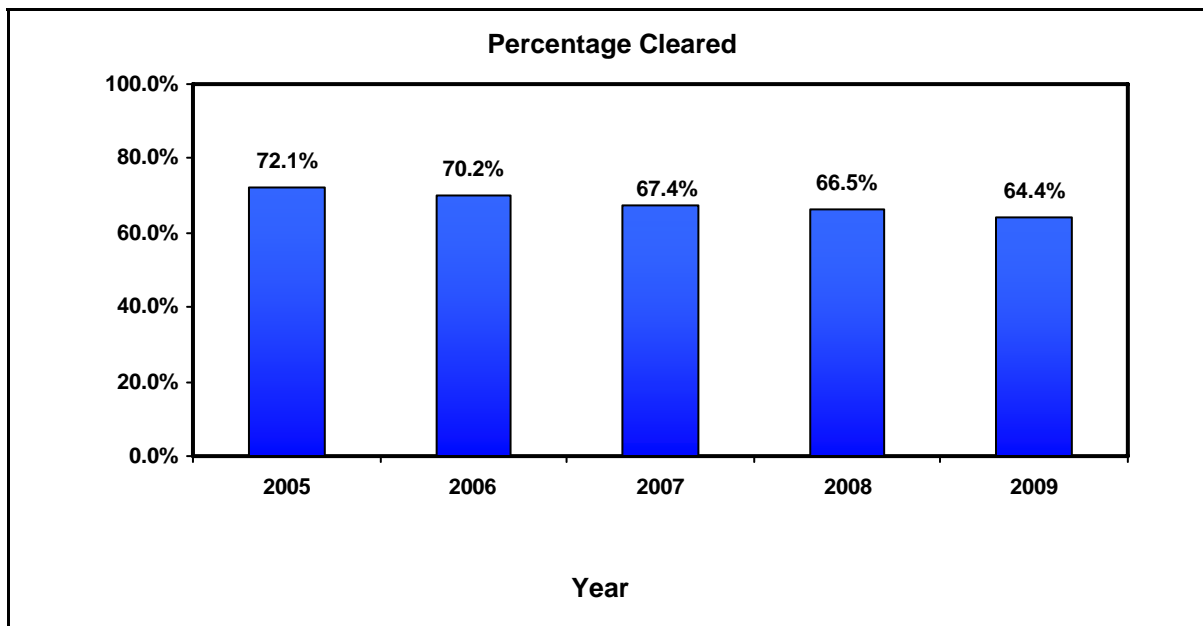
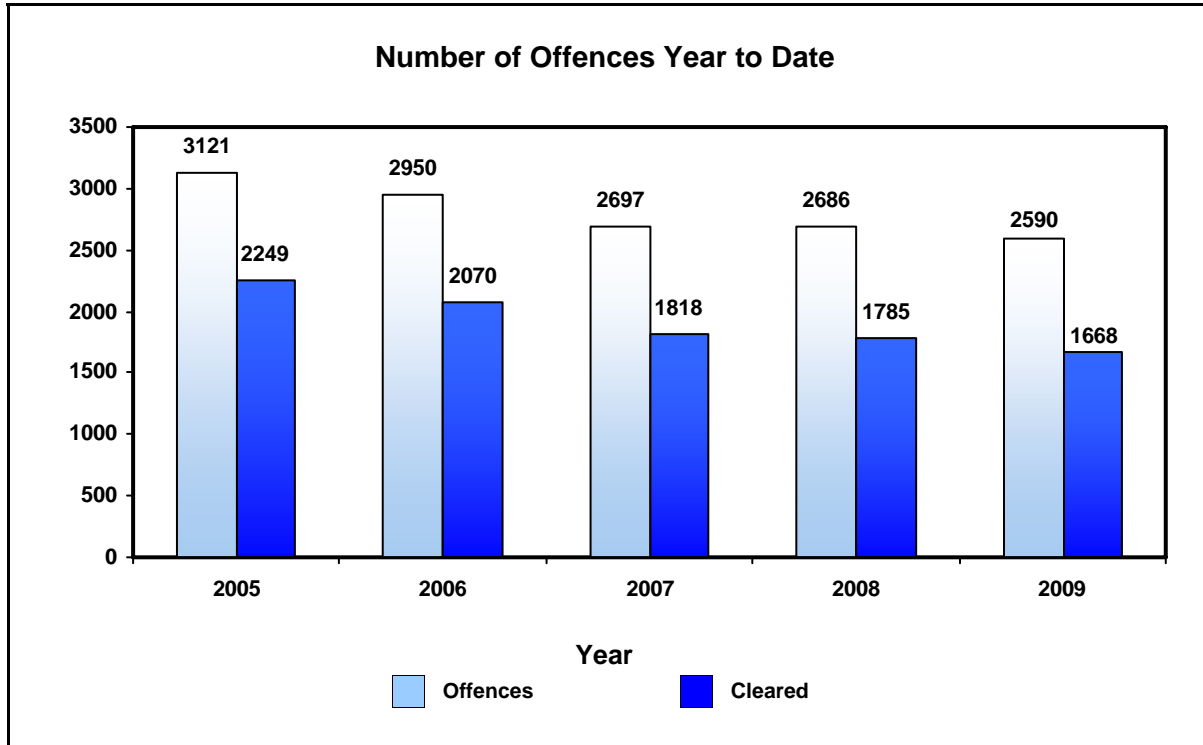
**Disorder call types include:** drunk, disturbance, indecent act, juvenile complaint, landlord/tenant dispute, mental health concern, neighbour dispute, party complaint, prowler, suspicious person, threats, drugs, noise complaint, possible gun shots, unwanted guest, prostitution, abandoned auto, speeder, suspicious auto, and shots fired.

\*Note: 1) All cancelled/unfounded calls are excluded (based on call type and disposition)

2) Call type: "Onview" refers to police generated calls; "Other" refers to Advised and Walk In calls (usually public generated); "Dispatched" includes Dispatched and Call Back calls (usually public generated).

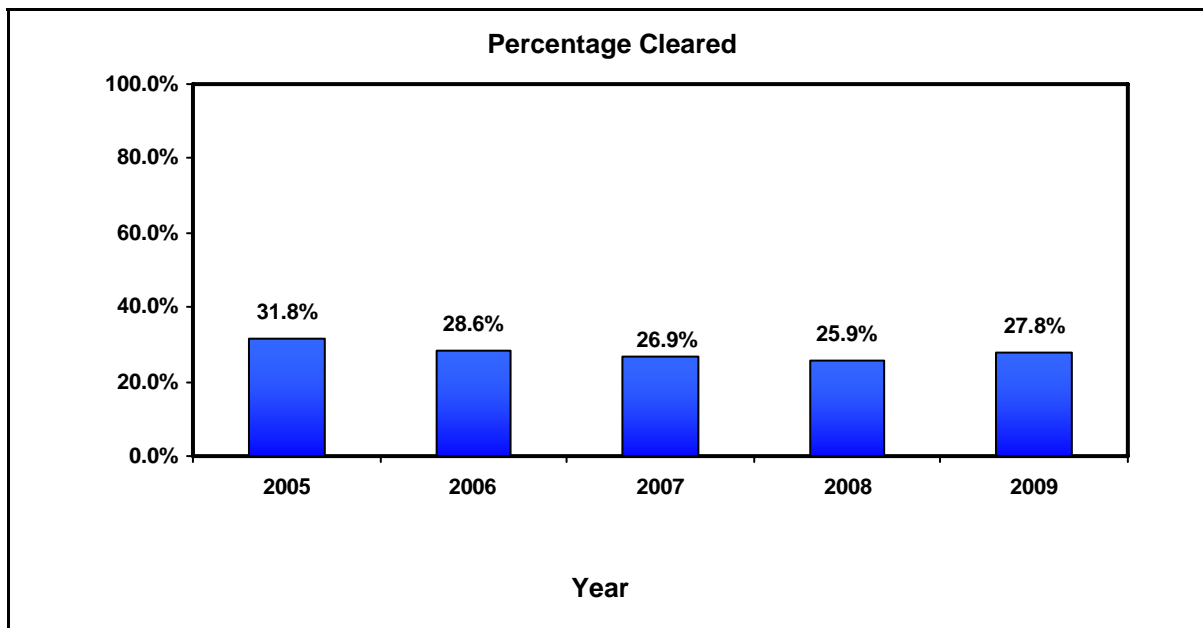
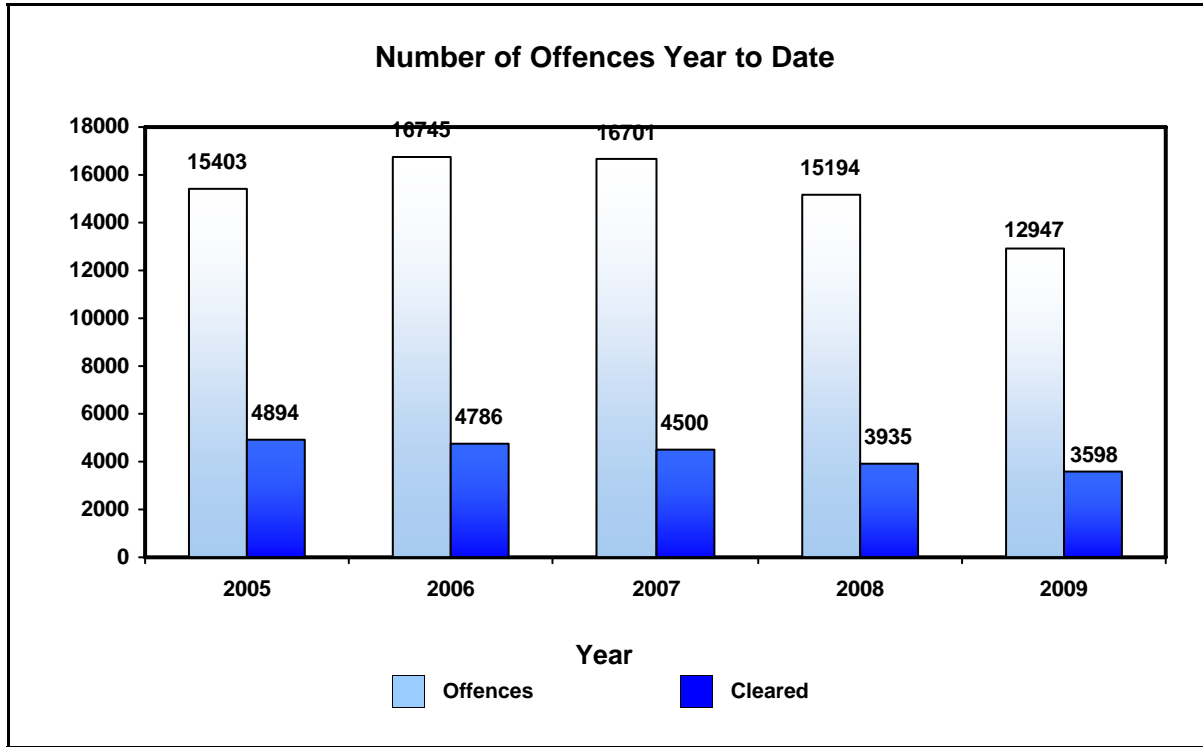
## Person Crimes - CUMULATIVE NUMBERS

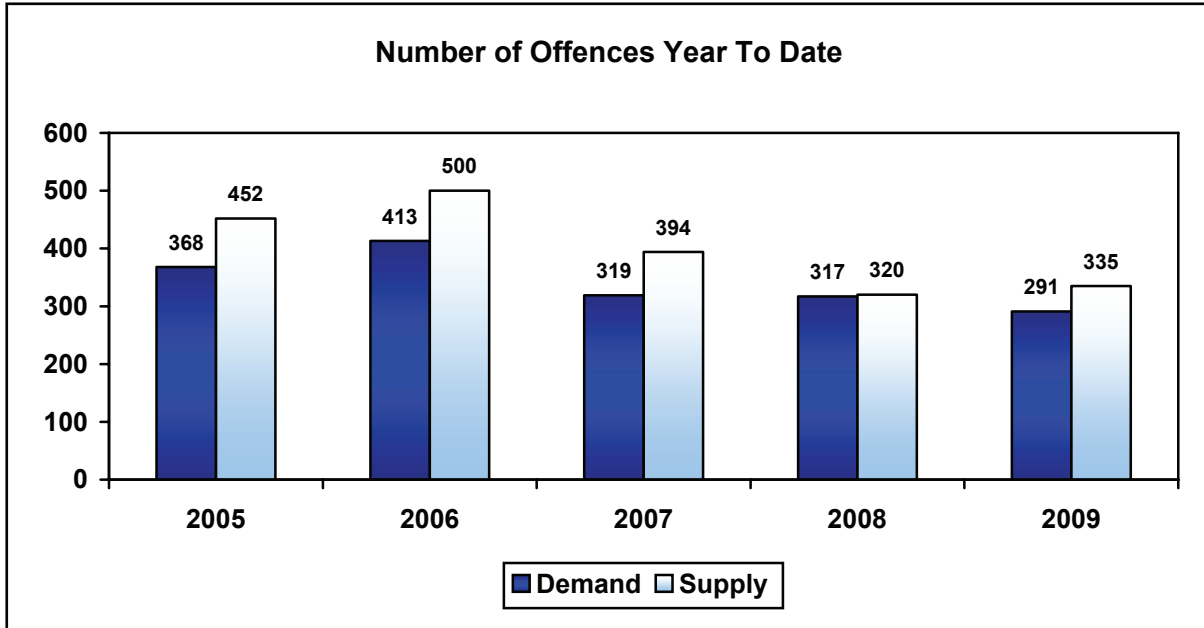
# Property Crimes - CUMULATIVE NUMBERS

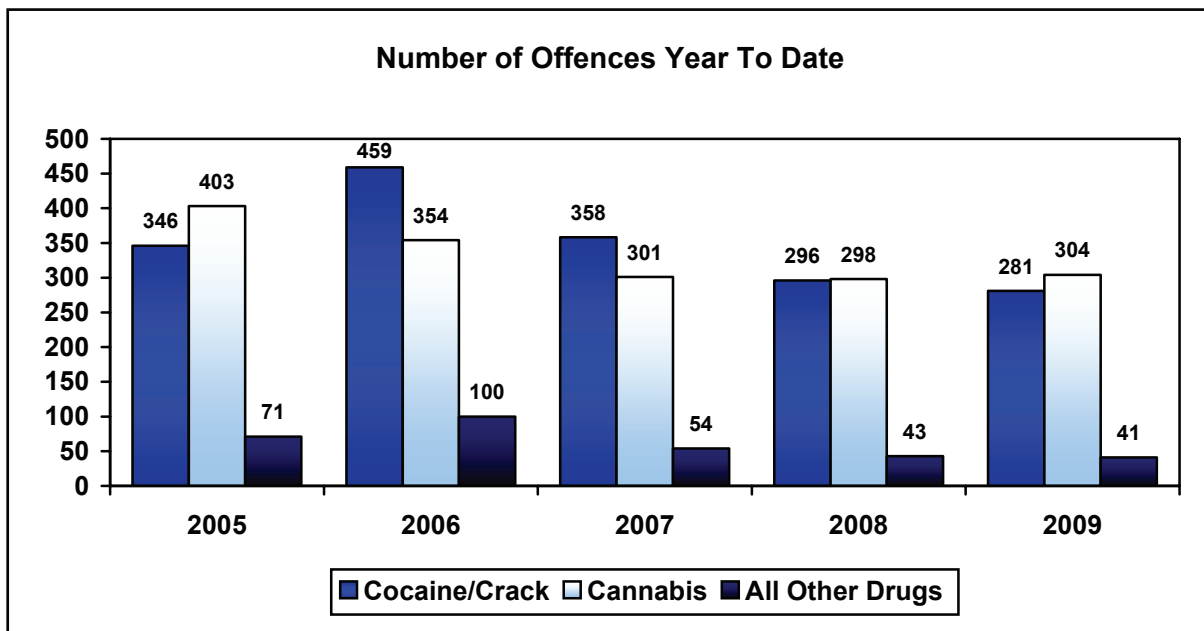


# Drug Offences – CUMULATIVE NUMBERS

When interpreting this data, it is imperative to consider that these figures represent only the number of collisions and they do not account for associated traffic volumes, weather conditions, types of collisions, driver experience, or any other variables which may or may not be significant factors. The locations denoted might be associated with intersections, on/off ramps, or mid-block locations, which are close but not necessarily at the exact specified locations. Collisions occurring on private properties, such as shopping mall parking lots have been excluded from the data in order to strictly assess intersection related collisions.
